

## EDITORIAL NOTES.

The previous number of the Bulletin was issued two years ago; last year it failed to materialise. Consequently the accounts of the activities of the Association given in the present number cover two years instead of one. It may be thought that these accounts take up an undue amount of room, but this is unavoidable if a proper record is to be preserved—a record which will show that the life of the Association has lost none of its vigour.

A second Easter visit was paid to Fort William in 1936, and was highly successful, as also was the second Alpine Meet, held at Fionnay in the Val des Bagnes, a comparatively peaceful and unspoilt valley, where trippers were few and wild flowers numerous.

In addition to the Fionnay party, other members were in various parts of the Alps during last summer. J. R. Jenkins and M. S. Taylor had a particularly good season at Chamonix with R. V. M. Barry, climbing Mont Dolent from the Argentière glacier, the Aiguille du Peigne, the Grépon by the Mer de Glace face, and, with P. L. Roberts, the Aiguille du Géant and the Brenva route on Mont Blanc. Later, Jenkins and Barry climbed the Aiguille de Blaitière by the Glacier Suspendu. A fine series of difficult climbs.

The indoor programmes have been very good, and remarkably well attended. The same may be said of the outdoor meets. On these the weather has provided the usual mixture of good and bad, but fortunately with the good slightly predominating.

We again have to thank a number of Kindred Clubs for the hospitality shown to those of our members who attended as guests at their annual Dinners.
